#### Report 2022

We have had another busy year at Brown Lodge. Thankfully things have continued to return to normal after the last couple of years of Covid challenges. All units are now back to face-to-face meetings and our list of hirers outside of Scouts and Guides continues to grow. I took over as Chair from Debbie in September 2021 and so this has been a learning curve for me!

One of my first challenges as Chair was the celebration for Brown Lodges 50<sup>th</sup> birthday in November. With the hard work of the committee, we had a fabulous day of celebrations split into 3 parties to reduce the amount of people in an enclosed space at any one time. It was great to see so many people, past and present, who have maintained, used, and supported Brown Lodge over the 50 years. Thank you to all who helped to put on this amazing day and coordinated guests, food, drinks, photos and newspaper articles, as well as the units who use Brown Lodge who decorated their display boards beautifully.

We have recently had some large works on the drainage systems to start to futureproof the building for the next 50 years and we are planning to continue with some more improvements to our building. We are currently working with an architect to update our toilets, install a disabled access toilet, baby changing unit, automatic doors, and a ramp to the front to make our building more accessible. With the help of the architect, we will be getting quotes from builders and be able to apply for a grant once the plans are all agreed. We then also are planning to sort the flooring as this has been down for 50 years too.

We have a great group of people who continue to help with looking after our building. Thank you to Carolyn who comes in regularly to give Brown Lodge a thorough clean, Graham who cuts the grass and maintains the garden. Also thank you to Paul, Dave, Rich, Graham, and Chris who work incredibly hard on any maintenance needed at Brown Lodge.

We continue to hire out Brown Lodge to more users who are not part of Scouting or Guiding, this helps greatly with the upkeep. Thank you to Paul for looking after and coordinating these hirings.

I would like to say a huge thank you to all the committee for their support and hard work, especially to Debbie for helping me to get to grips with my new role and to Amy who took on Treasurer having not long joined the committee!

# Scout Section Annual Report 2021/2022

This report covers the twelve months to Easter 2022.

We started the year as we finished the last, on Zoom, explaining our plans for the forthcoming term. We split the Troop into three large Patrols, the leaders who were not yet comfortable meeting face to face ran activities on Zoom, whilst some ran three "late pancake nights" at Brown Lodge and others oversaw a Monopoly Run around the village. The rest of the term was outside and at Brown Lodge. Rotations included Kayaking, Air Rifle Shooting, Archery, Geocaching and Tomahawk Throwing.

Other activities during the year included Foreign Cooking, Map and Compass work, Summer Camp Slide Show (from 2019 & 2015), Scouts made Concrete Poppies, Celebrated Brown Lodge @ 50, went Tubing, Christmas Party, Pioneering, making a Hot Vegan Soup, Wide Games, Winter Olympics, Pancake Night, First Aid, Taskmaster, Escape Rooms and Ten Pin Bowling.

Rev Jacqui Hyde kindly came and talked to us about Remembrance and her Great Uncle's experiences during WW2.

Our camping experiences were limited, as there was no Spring Camp. Many Scouts had missed out on Nights Away opportunities, so it was decided to run a weekend's PL Training Camp at Haw Bridge to remind those who had camped with us before what to do, and then to hold a long weekend Summer Camp for the rest of the Troop who wished to join us. The few days in between would be a nice relaxing time for the leaders, but, it was suggested that the Beavers, Cubs and Explorers could use the field during the quiet time. All Scouts happily provided clear Covid tests before attending and, fortunately, before leaving both camps. As we were only local, this was an ideal opportunity to show parents what all of the kit they had helped load on a lorry in previous years was brought for. The District Commissioner visited us and very bravely agreed to judge the Competition Meal. Winter Camp was at Huish Woods near Taunton, our departure from Churchdown was delayed due to Storm Eunice, so one night was spent at Brown Lodge and we left for Taunton early Saturday morning.

Falcon Patrol won the Cooking Competition in December, well done Freddie.

In March Scouts were invited to take part in a Night Hike which was run by 7<sup>th</sup> Swindon Scout Troop in which Eagle Patrol won an award, well done Sophie.

Remembrance Parade was limited to two Leaders and colour party only. There was no Christmas Carol Service, but Scouts did attend St George's Day Parade in Gloucester.

Scout numbers have risen slightly over the year to 38.

Finally, I would like to thank all the Leaders for their help and support, without which none of this would have been possible.

This year one of our Explorers successfully completed her Platinum Award and we have many Explorers assisting as Young Leaders with the Churchdown Scout Group, across the different Sections.

The Explorers enjoyed a Covid secure Summer Camp in July 2021. For many was the first experience of camping with Phoenix Explorers and they all had a fantastic time, cooking on open fires, sleeping in Section tents and generally spending time with each other outdoors and away from their homes for the first time in many months due to lock-downs. We have also spent evenings cooking up a storm with 'ready steady cook', blind cook (recipe given but not title to the dish), vegan nights, outdoor pizza and paella nights, and BBQs. To fit in with the seasons of the year we also created a Winter Olympic event evening, easter egg hunt, Christmas party, and painted several community crowns for the Queens platinum jubilee.





The Explorers look forward to BEAST camp every year and this year was no exception. All those who attended thoroughly enjoyed themselves and the activities which were put on. They are looking forward to next year already. The Explorers were sorry that no Explorer Network Ball was able to be held last year but are looking forward to the Ball this year.

We are delighted that one of our Explorers was selected to be part of the World Scout Jamboree in 2023. To support their fund raising efforts the Explorers took up the opportunity to work with the Round Table on the Santa Run in Up Hatherley. The Explorers have developed several activities with for fundraising which they will arrange during next year to assist.



The Explorer section has continued to grow and during the next year the Explorers will have the opportunity to take part in the Churchdown Gang Show, Gloucester Gang Show, BEAST, Strategy and we hope to enable several weekend camps and a summer camp.

As we go into the next year we are looking for additional adult help, whether from new Leaders, parents, Active Support Unit members or Occasional Helpers as there are known, planned attendance gaps which need to managed and mitigated during the Autumn Term in particular.
